

## Objectives and Actions of the APSG

### Purpose

In line with paper 03\_APSG\_19\_06\_Policy\_Updates, this paper aims to outline key aims, objectives and actions of the APSG focussing on deliverables of the group from October 2019 to April 2020, ensuring sustainability of actions moving forward.

### Background

The Access Programme's Steering Group was set up to consider and implement recommendation 4 of The Commission on Widening Access' final report *A Blueprint for Fairness*, as well as take into consideration recommendations 7 (Bridging Programmes) and 15 (Early Years Support). The Implementation Overview Report (IOR) provides further information on the key actions and timescales which were agreed for the group with the Scottish Government.

### Progress towards IOR timescales

The IOR which was circulated in paper 01\_AP\_Steering\_Group\_19\_01 at the first meeting of the APSG can be found in Appendix A below. Based on the milestones which were provided, an update on progression towards meeting these timescales is listed below and suggestions on actions to meet future deadlines.

Members are asked to review the timeline provided above and make any further suggestions on additional actions/outcomes of the group.

### **Outcome Based Remits**

Outcome based remits have been discussed and suggestions circulated for potential subgroups to progress key development areas which were highlighted through the mapping exercise. However, there has been very few people sign up to participate in these subgroups. Given the actions and deadlines listed above, members are asked to suggest ways in which members can successfully feed into these; for example, members are grouped and given a key 'specialist' subject on which they present to the group at the Jan/Feb and April 2020 meetings to form the basis of discussion on recommendations for the final report/paper.
